On Friday 13 august 2010 a small contingent of NZ Veterans and their families attended the official VP day lunch held at the Chatswood RSL club.



Veterans Pay Their Respects

In June this year over one hundred Australians and ten New Zealanders made their way to the Malaysian state of Perak to take part in several commemoration services to mark the 50th Anniversary of the cessation of the Malayan Emergency in July 1960.



My wife Susie and I were lucky enough to join the 2010 Australian contingent and were delighted to meet up with some fine representatives and some old friends from our home country of New Zealand. The picture left was taken in the Syuen Hotel in

Ipoh where the majority of the veterans stayed. In the front row are Russell and Nada Byrne and Ripeka (Nicky) Raupita. Second row in the hat is Niwa Kawha, then John Sturgess, Gordon Paku, and Joe Sturmey. At the back are Roger Carter, Graeme Turvey and Susie Carter.

Not all of the above had served in the Malayan Emergency but all the men had served in the region at some stage of their military career. The common thread amongst all of the veterans and wives was to pay their respects to those that had served before them, especially the ones that had paid the supreme sacrifice.

The Malayan Emergency, sometimes called the forgotten war, started in June 1948 following the assassination of three European plantation managers in the state of Perak by communist terrorists of the Malayan Communist Party. In the next twelve years 6,700 guerrillas, 1,800 Malayan and commonwealth troops, over 1,000 Malayan Police and more than 3,000 civilians lost their lives in the conflict. During this time thirty nine Australians and fifteen New Zealanders also lost their lives, though not all due to enemy activity. The emergency became the longest military commitment in Australian history and involved military forces from many countries in the British Commonwealth.

The National Malaya and Borneo Veterans Associations of Australia have been visiting the area around Taiping for several years and have built up a tremendous rapport with the local civic authorities and many ex Malaysian service men and women. I will now briefly summarise the five days of services and functions held in June this year. The first night "roof top party" was a chance to meet and greet old and new friends before breakfast at 0600 hrs the next morning, and then it was off to the

Kamunting Road Cemetery near Taiping. This was an impressive service with many dignitaries present. An Australian infantry company travelled down from Butterworth and many wreaths were laid, but for us Kiwis it was especially moving as the brother of Niwa Kawha is resting here and we had the opportunity to pay our respects to other fallen NZ soldiers also. This fine cemetery is now maintained by the Australian War Graves Commission. We gave thanks to their representative Kathy Upton-Mitchell who is responsible for the tidy upkeep of our countrymen's graves and last resting place.

During an enjoyable lunch and a few Tigers at the Taiping New Club we had the chance to mix with the Australian and Malaysian soldiers. Australia still uses Butterworth airbase as a staging post to other postings like Afghanistan and also for jungle training exercises.

That night we were guests at a sumptuous dinner, including drinks, provided by the Australian Minister for Veteran Affairs the Hon Alan Griffin MP. During the dinner Russell Byrne made an entertaining speech and all the local leaders were given gifts of appreciation. John Sturgess and I were impressed with the personal service of jugs of Tiger.

The next day we assembled at the cenotaph near the Ipoh railway station where an Anzac service is held every year. Dozens of wreaths were laid, and I was impressed with the service to the fallen of two World Wars, the Emergency, Confrontation and the Re-Insurgency. Having lead parts in the service was an Indian Anglican bishop, a Malay imam, a Hindu priest, and two Buddhist monks. Listening to four different languages did not diminish the sincerity of the occasion and the two Gurkha pipers and one bugler from Brunei gave the ceremony added colour.





The Malaysian Police provided a catafalque party and honour guard and the friendly Gurkhas looked resplendent in their tropical whites and tartan trews.

The main Gurkha base is in Dover now and one of the side issues is that many of the locally born recruits do not speak Nepalese or Gurkhali.

The Perak State Government provided lunch and we were treated to an hour long professionally presented cultural show to the delight of all. I was particularly impressed with the controlled playing of a school concert band.

The evening was free but knowing that reveille was at 0500 hrs, the intake of tiger, nasi goreng, satay sticks and other Malaysian delights in a local market was kept to a minimum so that our aging bodies could get the amount of sleep that they required.

Next day a leisurely one hour drive through the early morning mist brought us to the lovely hospital chapel at Batu Gajah, where, after prayers and much hymn singing we walked over to the Christian cemetery aptly named Gods Little Acre. It is here that the three bodies of the planters killed in 1948 by the communist terrorists lay, and this service is organised by the local people and the Malaysian Palm Oil Association every year. We also managed to find a couple of kiwi headstones one dating from 1937 and another from 1941.

After a refreshing drink and welcome snacks in the chapel ground, the convoy of four buses and assorted official cars headed off to the Royal Malaysian Rangers camp at Syed Putra. Upon arrival we were greeted by every officer and SNCO before we settled down under a large tent for a Gurkha Remembrance Ceremony.





One of the first buildings sighted at Kem Syed Putra was the rugby club, bringing back many memories of late afternoon games followed by a good pint in the NAAFI. The extra long line of welcoming officers and SNCO's had me alternating between Good Morning, Selamat Pagi and Apa Kabar. I received some strange looks but it somehow made the unbearable heat go away. The gentleman in the dark shirt below is Mr Bill Adamson from Perth. Bill was born at Batu Gajah in 1937 and his first language was Chinese as he was initially raised by his Chinese amah. The last photo shows the official wreath bearers in the large Gurkha cemetery.





The Malaysian Rangers farewelled us with cold drinks and sandwiches then it was off to the Royal Ipoh Club for lunch and many beers put on by the Malaysian Palm Oil Association of Perak. The lunch was interrupted by a power cut and speeches, and then our departure was delayed by a severe tropical downpour. Surface flooding was all around us so there was no choice but to stay inside and have another one.

On the other side of the Padang we could see the old FMS Hotel where many a kiwi soldier had spent a few happy hours in the bar with hosts Uncle and Nephew. I had always thought that the names uncle and nephew were coined by the soldiers, but apparently they were well known by the locals by those names. I was informed that Uncle died many years ago but Nephew had only died the week before we were there. The FMS is now closed but it will be fully restored as a historic building under a

UNESCO plan. Many older parts of Penang and Malacca are also being preserved in the same way; so many old soldiers will feel at home when they return to check out their old stamping grounds. Just don't expect the prices to be the same.....or the girls!!

That concluded the official part of the proceedings and in the evening we all enjoyed a few free drinks at our hotel. The NZ contingent departed Ipoh in the morning, and that evening the large Australian party were guests of Colonel Yunis Ali (Rtd), at his large house on the edge of a beautiful golf course. Yunis actually took over the grounds of three adjacent houses as well and we all a great time. I had forgotten what hot work it is drinking outside in the tropics.

A special mention must be made of Steve Toon and his assistant John Plenty who ran the whole show without any major hiccups. It was an enormous task to liaise with all involved and we must thank Steve and his wife Lyn sincerely for all of their efforts.

Whilst we would gladly accept your membership I would request you contact me so we can discuss your expectations against what is achievable.



Navy ships homeward bound



HMNZS TE KAHA at the Canadian Navy's 100th anniversary celebrations (WN 10-0145-006).

10 August 2010

After a four and a half months overseas deployment the sailors onboard warship HMNZS TE KAHA and tanker HMNZS ENDEAVOUR will arrive home to be reunited with their family and friends at the Devonport Naval Base at 9:45 am on Wednesday 11 August 2010.

The past four and a half months have seen TE KAHA and ENDEAVOUR take part in EXERCISE BERSAMA SHIELD off Singapore.

The two ships were part of the Canadian Navy's 100th Anniversary celebrations which included an International Fleet Review. The ships then visited ports on the west coast of Canada and the United States of America. TE KAHA was also in Shanghai for the World Expo in May.

Chief of Navy, Rear Admiral Tony Parr and the Maritime Component Commander, Commodore Ross Smith will be in attendance at the base to welcome the ships home. TE KAHA will fire a 17-gun salute to the Chief of Navy's Personal Flag at approx 9:35 am on 11 August and PHILOMEL will return a 7-gun salute.

The New Zealand Defence Force is presently informing next of kin that a soldier serving in Afghanistan has been killed in an attack on a New Zealand Provincial Reconstruction Team patrol in Bamyan province.

Two other Defence Force personnel taking part in the patrol have been wounded.

The Defence Force is currently consolidating information from the area.

There will be a media conference at Defence Force HQ at approx 7.10am.

'Raising the Flag' – Hospitality RSA 2010

Over 100 RSA Club Presidents, Managers and senior staff recently attended the RSA's inaugural hospitality conference 'Raising the Flag' – Hospitality RSA 2010 held in Wellington 13-15 July.

The aim of the conference was to arm local RSAs with new skills and knowledge needed to continue to raise our flag in the community.


In recent years clubs have dwindled, amalgamations have sometimes been forced, as opposed to agreed, and some clubs have closed. The one constant has been change and RSA members want the skills and tools needed to ensure their clubs are viable in the future.

Key themes from the conference were based around:

 The demands of hospitality today with a focus on business operations and the development of strategic and business plans, good governance and management practices, training, understanding your offering and looking at new products







- Operational tools like centralised accounting systems, new bar assessment software, and ATM machines
- Marketing and communication practices such as club loyalty programmes, marketing plans and reaching your audience through the media (TV, radio, newspapers, websites and social media networks)

Recent examples of these themes in action were reinforced by presentations by Tauranga and Opotiki RSA delegates.

RSA Tauranga delegates provided an insight into seizing an opportunity and converting a motor inn into a new club. The Opotiki RSA told conference members how



amalgamation can be a mutually beneficial process for both parties provided that the right planning is done.

Delegates were able to take away with them:

- The tools to create a strategic plan
- A software application to assist chefs with menus and food costs
- An update on the liquor licensing laws and how they need to be applied
- Information on benefits associated with an ATM and a centralised accounting system

General feedback from delegates indicated a need for continued education and professional development opportunities.

National Office will shortly have key points available for RSAs and these will be emailed out in September.

National Council Meeting 2010, Michael Fowler Centre, Wellington

Monday 11 October – Wednesday 13 October

This year's annual National Council Meeting will be held in Wellington from Monday 11 October to Wednesday 13 October 2010.

We have received 29 remits for consideration during the business sessions.

Important presentations include the findings from the Nielsen Research into RSA Membership and its practical application over the next decade, as well as presentations on how the RSA needs to review its structure and improve its governance practices.

The Pensions and Welfare Workshop on Monday morning will take delegates through the War Pensions process with the assistance of key individuals: Greg Crott (Deputy Secretary for War Pensions) David McGregor (Chair of the War Pensions Appeal Board) and Dr Anne Campbell (health/medical issues). At the Forum in the afternoon delegates will hear from Rick Ottaway (General Manager VANZ) and can participate in a Q&A session.

The just completed Hospitality RSA Conference enables the Business Forum to devote its attention to two major issues facing RSAs in 2011. The first issue is the liquor licence legislation. The second is the Rugby World Cup 2011 Tournament and how both the RSA and the RWC can benefit.

The Council programme will be completed by Friday, 10 September and available via the private site, emailed directly to you or published in the next Flagstaff.



National Office 2010/11 Business Plan Update

Our business plan has been developed from last year's Future Forum at National Council and the NEC Strategy Workshop. The plan is in direct response to the National Council's directive to use increased capitation to create new benefits for RSAs and members.

Flagstaff will provide monthly progress reports against the agreed key deliverables.

For July/August the following was achieved:

Analyse our market potential: Nielsen Research commissioned, project commenced and some initial findings made available

Advocate for War Pensions Act Rewrite: Law Commission's report on the re-write of the War Pensions Act 1954 tabled in Parliament – RSA advice provided

Increase benefits to clubs and grow better clubs: 'Raising the Flag' Hospitality RSA 2010 Conference

Upgrade communication methods and systems: Communication audit completed, communication strategy under development, Flagstaff e-newsletter launched

Improve relations with RSAs: Visited 10 RSAs in West Auckland

Clarify roles and responsibilities of National Office: Review commenced August 2010

Nielsen Research: Initial Findings

What is the research project about?

The research project seeks to find out what people think about the RSA, why they join, why they don't, what appeals and what doesn't. The results will inform ongoing strategic work on the RSA brand and help us determine the shape of the RSA for the next 5-10 years.

Who are they talking to?

Nielsen researches have been talking to RSA members and non-members, service and non-service personnel across the country.

When will we know the outcome?

Top level findings will be presented at the National Council Meeting this October.

Some initial research findings

- The RSA is competing in the hospitality sector where competition is intense. Barriers to visiting or joining an RSA are linked to perceptions of old fashioned premises, big open spaces, unsophisticated dining and restrictive membership rules.
- People want an RSA that looks to the future, reflects modern kiwi culture and celebrates life, with up-to-date facilities, that is progressive and vibrant whilst still respecting traditional values around remembrance.
- People want a welcoming and inclusive membership policy and equality was a popular theme (non- service members can feel like they are intruding).
- People want to support the RSA and what it stands for, but not necessarily join a club.
- Remembrance is a valued point of difference for the RSA (there is respect for war heroes and people felt proud of what we had become as a nation) but it is too focussed on the past.
- The RSA's welfare work has a very low profile outside the veteran community.
