ANZAC Day 2009

ANZAC Day in 2009 will more than likely be the same format as this and previous years with descendents marching with us. However, just to clarify, the term 'veteran' in today's context refers to all serving and ex-service personnel not just those that served overseas. So whether you have a medal or not, as long as



you served in the military you are considered a veteran and I would be very privileged to march alongside you at ANZAC Day every year.

Furthermore, both the

Parade Marshall and I will be more controlling next year so that Veterans are at the front of the contingent with descendents behind and any other matters that need addressing based on your feedback.

The NZ Regular Force Cadets

During the period of the "Cold War" between 1948 and 1991, an average of over 5000 New Zealand boys vied each year for

entry into the Army's elite RF Cadet School or the "Club" as it was colloquially known. Less than 3% of those who applied to join, made the grade. The Army accepted them as young as 15 into its ranks offering continued education, trade training and apprenticeships. Most would go on at age 18 to become the backbone of the New Zealand Army serving with distinction in Korea, Borneo, Malaya, Vietnam, Bosnia, Afghanistan, East Timor, Iraq and other regions of conflict as Senior Non - Commissioned Officers (NCOs). A few would earn commissions as officers. Some went on to serve with the SAS and as key personnel of other Regular Force units.

Today they can be found in leadership roles in all aspects of business, social services, government and politics following their successful careers in the Army and other arms of the services, both at home and abroad. Coinciding with the end of the cold war the School closed its doors in 1991.

For you RF Cadet veterans, attached to this NewZletter is the Registration Form for the 60th anniversary reunion celebrations to be held at Arena Manawatu in Palmerston North over the Labour Weekend.

NZ Veterans in Australia

Dear Veterans, there has been some discussion recently that started with how NZ Veterans in Australia can obtain qualitative support from the RNZRSA but eventually expanded to how all NZ Veterans in Australia can have a say in matters relating to NZ Veterans as one collective group within the RNZRSA, NZDF, VANZ and the NZ Government. Whilst the NZ Sub-Branch and WA have a Charter with the RNZRSA, it does not include veterans from all the other States. Furthermore, even having a Charter does not mean that the groups are included in veteran matters. For example, the MoU agreed between the NZ Government and Vietnam Veterans was negotiated between the NZ Government and the RNZRSA/EVSA. With so many veterans in Australia and more or less no substantial support from the RNZRSA, VANZ, NZDF or the NZ Government, it is timely that consideration be given to how we can be regarded as a large enough collective group to be included in all veteran matters being progressed in NZ such as changes to the Acts and future MoUs or agreements. Do we establish a RNZRSA Australia? Or the NZ Sub-Branch of the RSL of Australia rather than of each State? Or the NZ Veterans Association of Australia? Whatever or however we progress this, there are many other matters that will need to be addressed such as funding, constitution, relationship between the NZ Veteran organisation and the RSL of Australia, goals, vision, mission statement, strategic direction, subsidies, fees...... But the most important matter that can make this work is having a President of this organisation that has the skills, experience and business acumen to be able to work with and across all levels of the veteran communities (RNZRSA, EVSA, NZDF, VANZ), both the Commonwealth and State Governments in Australia and the NZ Government.

At the end of the day, the NZ Sub-Branch is currently established in NSW and Victoria and I am not sure if there are other NZ Sub-Branches in other States. Therefore, we can continue to operate as separate groups lobbying separately for the support of the NZ veteran communities or consider forming a Australia

wide collective group and be invited to discuss any matters relating to NZ Veterans as is done for the RNZRSA and EVSA.

In order to determine how much support this has please feel free to comment and provide feedback with your views, suggestions or ideas. I would also be interested in whether there is anyone out there that could lead this organisation.

Century of service for Medical Corps celebrated



100 years of Army service to the medical profession will be celebrated in Palmerston North next week (8-13 July).

The Royal New Zealand Army Medical Corps (RNZAMC),

which has often deployed with the New Zealand Defence Force (NZDF) to operations ranging from humanitarian aid and disaster relief situations to conflict zones, was formally established in 1908.

Among the highlights of the centennial celebrations will be the Centennial Medic Challenge for the 'Kidman Trophy' on Thursday 10 July, a day-long competition that will test NZ Army medic's skill in providing combat casualty care.

Other activities during the week include: A medical conference, a medic poster competition, a centennial parade and the 'Century of Service' Ball. They will take place at locations across Palmerston North including Linton Military Camp and the refurbished Awapuni Raceway.

A centennial cocktail party will also see the launch of the book: "The Staff, the Serpent and the Sword" by Captain (Retired) Ken Treanor and the unveiling of RNZAMC Centennial painting by Army Artist Captain Matt Gauldie.

Regimental Colonel of the Medical Corps Brigadier Anne Campbell said the week recognises a long history of loyal service by the Corps which has seen some significant developments in providing medical treatment.

"The Corps is able to provide complex delivery of the healthcare that has advanced over the last century; from antibiotics, to the availability of vaccinations, advancement in resuscitation and surgery, prevention of illness and injury with better protective equipment, and of course the availability of aero medical evacuations. This reflects where medicine was during WWI to now. Many of these advances were trialled on the battlefield. What a century."

History: Royal New Zealand Army Medical Corps

- The foundation of the RNZAMC was as a volunteer medical bearer corps (later renamed field ambulances) established in 1898.
 The New Zealand Medical Corps (NZMC) was formally established in 1908. This included the establishment of an Army Nursing Reserve.
- More than 3600 members of the Corps served with the 1st New Zealand Expeditionary Force in World War One. The NZMC remained as a separate Territorial Force corps and was greatly affected by defence cuts in the depression but was revived during the Second World War.
- After 1945 the NZMC was subsumed within the New Zealand Army Medical Corps which in 1947 was granted the prefix 'Royal' to enable it to become the Royal New Zealand Army Medical Corps (RNZAMC).
- Currently, the RNZAMC is responsible for the evacuation and treatment of casualties as well as promoting health, preventing disease and providing assessment of armed forces personnel.
- During the last 100 years of service the Corps has served overseas in such theatres as Egypt, Gallipoli, France, Flanders, Palestine, Greece, Crete, North Africa, Italy, the South Pacific, Korea, Malaya, Vietnam, Iraq, Somalia, Bosnia, Bougainville, East Timor, Indonesia and Afghanistan.

Three teams from the New Zealand Defence Force (NZDF) will be practicing their hitchhiking skills over the next few months in preparation for a major fundraiser for Cure Kids, the Accor Queenstown \$10 Challenge, from 1-3 October.

Teams participating in the event are given \$10 and have to use various modes of transport to get from Auckland to Queenstown in three days. There are 35 teams taking part and the team that arrives in Queenstown with the most points after undertaking a wide variety of challenges on the way will be the winner.



The NZDF teams are

- Navy: Sub-Lieutenant Fraser Toulmin and Sub-Lieutenant Darcy Topp,
- Army: Lieutenant Christian Anderson and Bas Bolyn,
- Air Force: Corporal Lydia Savage and Pilot Officer Sean McKeogh.

SLT Toulmin from the Navy team said, "Surviving on our wits is something we are trained to do in Defence so our teams should do well. However, it's not just about the challenge of getting to Queenstown; it's about raising awareness for Cure Kids and the thousands of children they help each year."

Prior to the event all teams participating in the Accor Queenstown \$10 Challenge have to raise \$7,000 for Cure Kids. Funds raised will be used for medical research into lifethreatening conditions that affect children.

To assist the teams' fundraising effort the NZDF will be holding a Help Cure Kids Coffee Day on 22 July where all personnel will be asked to donate the cost of a cup of coffee to the teams' fundraising effort.

"The public are invited to support our teams and can easily donate to the cause using our online fundraising pages on the Cure Kids website www.curekids.org.nz," said SLT Toulmin.

RNZAF Hercules shows muscles during test flights



Following the recent test flights of the newly modified Boeing 757, the first of the Royal New Zealand Air Force's upgraded C-130 Hercules has completed a series of

successful test flights at L-3 Communications Spar Aerospace facilities in Edmonton, Canada.

The upgrade, described by contractor L-3 Communications Spar Aerospace as the most comprehensive modernisation project ever undertaken on a C-130 worldwide, included centre wing refurbishment, a major rewire, replacement of the aircraft's communication and navigation systems with more modern systems and an upgrade to the C-130 self-protection system.

"The new aircraft will enhance our ability to operate with aircraft from other nations and decrease the workload of the crew in operational environments. By design, it should also make the aircraft easier to maintain and improve reliability," said RNZAF C-130 test pilot Squadron Leader Pete Saunders.

"There will be 86 hours of Acceptance Test flying which involves taking the new systems through their paces to confirm compliance. This will be followed up at home with further testing to ensure suitability during Operational Test and Evaluation," said Squadron Leader Saunders.

Two of the Air Force's fleet of five Hercules are being upgraded by L-3 Communications Spar Aerospace. The remaining three Hercules will be upgraded by Safe Air Limited, based in Blenheim.

The upgrade commenced in 2005 and is part of the C-130 Life Extension Project which will extend the operational capability of the Air Force's fleet of five Hercules until 2017.

Background

Description:

The Air Force's five C-130 Hercules aircraft are undergoing a progressive life-extension upgrade which will see the replacement of specific mechanical, avionic, and structural components. This includes centre wing refurbishment, a major rewire and new flight deck instrumentation and an upgrade to the C-130 self-protection system. The Life Extension Project will significantly improve the availability and reliability of the RNZAF C-130 fleet and ensure it continues to comply with evolving air traffic control

regulations.

Request for Tender (RFT) Issued 15 July 2003. RFT Closed 15 October 2003. Best and Final Offer (BAFO) issued 24 March 2004, BAFO Closed 19 May 2004. The preferred tender was announced on 6 August 2004. The contract was awarded on 14 December 2004.
